Each project or even specific lessons may require extra items and your teacher will let you know. The following guide gives you an idea of the requirements for each project **in addition to the basic toolkit**.

Creative Media KS2-KS3

The creative media project-based course is designed for primary students to learn and develop products for real world application within creative industries through engagement with sustained and independent enquiry. The course aims to develop students' imagination, communication skills and creativity, as well as their understanding and enjoyment of the commercial arts and media.

Creative media offers you the opportunity to study a range of media practices such as debate and advertising, including video, photography, sound, animation, and digital media. Students can choose to focus on one medium, develop several or integrate across the range to find their own creative voice.

Year 3

Let's Draw

Students learn basic drawing skills by looking at Andy Warhol and his cat sketches, Michael Craig Martin's large wall murals and Henri Matisse's paper cut out drawings. Students finish up by completing an observational drawing of autumn leaves.

Let's Colour

Students created artworks inspired by Helen Frankenthaler, Georgia O'Keefe and explored how artists use colour. They then created a diorama inspired by Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama's installation "Obliteration Room" (2002), which begins as a white space and ends with thousands of colourful spots stuck everywhere.

Year 4

Pop Idol

Students study Pop Art and mask making using inspirational people as influence. Students experiment with Pop Art techniques and bold colourful mask designs.

Chimera Creatures

Students studied the mythology of the Greek Chimera creature made up of several different animals. Students created their own animal sculptures influenced by Oaxacan ('Wahakan') papier mâché Alebrijes made by folk artists in Mexico. These animal sculptures use colourful patterns and shapes.

Year 5

Pointillism

Students explore divisionism and complimentary colours using the artist's colour wheel. They look at Yayoi Kusama and Ana Enshina's modern pointilist art, alongside stippling and textile design. Students then explore pixilation and digital printing - a technological pointillism. They finish up with paper quilling and produce a final piece.

Year 6

Anthropomorphism

Students created an animal inspired character for a book, game, film, ceremony or artwork. Their animal character combines elements of each student's identity and personality with those of their chosen character. Students have looked at various case studies including the Disney franchise.

Year 7

Year 9

Art KS3

The KS3 art course is a project-based course where students learn and develop traditional visual art skills through engagement with sustained and independent enquiry. Many practical techniques are implemented, and this includes painting, drawing, modelling, digital art and photography.

Teachers make use of the webcam feature each week to guide students through the various techniques. The completed pieces of art that are produced by the students are shared for viewing and feedback. This may be during the session or week to week as part of an assignment or an independent study activity.

Year 7/8

Advanced Sketchbooking

Students study advanced sketchbooking with an exploration of visual process diaries to document ideas and research. They learn how to present information in a way that help build their portfolio of work and that deepens understanding of research topics.

Lastly, students will develop observational drawing skills by sketching a photo-realistic portrait

Year 9

Painting skills

This is an advanced painting unit. Students learn traditional fine art skills including watercolour, acrylic and oil painting. They will experiment with different mark making techniques using various brushes/tools appropriate to the medium. Students will then explore homemade paint and painting using photography. A key focus will be on art historical examples of these techniques and how artists have used them to great effect in their work.

Mark-making skills

This is an advanced mark-making unit. Students learn traditional sketching skills including graphite, charcoal and ink. There is a focus on perspective drawing and the grid technique. Students will look at monoprinting and digital drawing to deepen their learning. A key focus will be on art historical examples of these techniques and how artists have used them to great effect in their work.

3D Mixed Media skills

This is an advanced sculptural unit. Students learn how to build and construct 3D materials into sculptural forms. A focus is on using a variety of materials in construction safely to appreciate the different structural qualities of each: textiles, found objects,



recycling, card, clay, wire. Students will learn how to document their 3D works for assessment. A key focus will be on art historical examples of these techniques and how sculptors have used them to great effect in their work. This course ends into a brief introduction to kinetic and assemblage sculpture that leads into Year 10 Assured Course in Art and Design.

KS4 Assured Course – Art and Design in Action

This course is suitable for learners aged 14 years and above. The art course is intended to allow students to access level 3 art qualifications through the development of relevant skills and a portfolio of their own artwork. Transferrable skills are learnt with respect to the use of research, planning, communicating, and evaluating within the creative process. These courses are not an iGCSE and cannot be considered as such.

Year 10

Cabinets of Curiosity: assemblage art and the ready-made

Students must research various artists creating assemblage artworks using found objects and ready-mades as their medium and then create personal responses to this research using the theme of 'Cabinets of Curiosity'. Students should explore symbolism and visual metaphor to communicate connections between objects in a personal and conceptual response presented as their final piece.

Art of Paper: using paper to communicate a concept

Students must research various artists and artworks using paper and performance art/video as mediums and then create personal responses to this research using the theme of 'narrative'. In this way, students should explore the potential of paper to communicate a concept in a personal and conceptual response presented as their final piece.

Year 11

Futurescapes: reimagining the cultural landscape through illustration

Module 3 focuses on Assessment Objectives 1 and 2 from the rubric and is designed to build the skills needed to produce visual research and critically analyse and reflect upon artists and artworks from different cultures. Students must research various artists and artworks and create personal responses to this research using the theme 'Futurescapes: reimagining the urban landscape through illustration'. Students produce a research presentation, essay and portfolio of experiments. Module 4 focuses on Assessment Objectives 3 and 4 from the rubric and is designed to build the skills needed to plan and realise a personal response, using a variety of techniques, processes, and materials.

KS4 Assured Course – Photography Perspectives

This course is suitable for learners aged 14 years and above. Designed for a wide range of students, the learning is of value to those wishing to gain an understanding of photographic techniques, the creative process and the photo imaging sector. Students will have opportunity to gain photographic knowledge and skills supporting their progress onto further qualifications, employment or self-employment and will develop a portfolio of their own photographs. These courses are not an iGCSE and cannot be considered as such.

Year 10

Truth and Lies: digital manipulation

Students must research various photographers who use digital and hand manipulation techniques, visual illusion and deception, and then create personal responses to this research using the theme of 'Truth and Lies'. Students should explore a variety of editing techniques using apps and software and refer to the formal elements and compositional techniques.

Exploring scale

Students must research various photographers using micro and macro techniques to compose their images and then create personal responses to this research using the theme. The final piece will be a curated collection of composed images.

Reflections: looking at light through lens-based media

Module 3 focuses on Assessment Objectives 1 and 2 from the rubric and is designed to build the skills needed to produce visual research and critically analyse and reflect upon photographers' work. Students must research various photographers who use reflection in their work and create personal responses to this research using the theme, 'Reflections: Exploring light and reflection through lens-based media'. Module 4 focuses on Assessment Objectives 3 and 4 from the rubric and is designed to build the skills needed to plan and realise a personal response, using a variety of techniques, processes, and materials.

- ✓ Camera/Camera Phone to produce and document work
- ✓ Photo editing software (Adobe Suite provided)
- ✓ Basic art supplies for sketchbook work
- ✓ Materials of choice for the project

Start gathering

You will need random items in your art tool kit for sketchbook work and experimentation. This allows you to try out texture, explore fabrics, shapes, and unusual materials etc. Here are some suggestions. What you gather is up to you!

- ✓ Cardboard (not too thick so you can easily cut with scissors). Old cereal or amazon boxes would do. Toilet rolls.
- ✓ Old newspapers, magazines, and brushes.
- \checkmark Bubble wrap, old clothes, unusual fabrics.
- ✓ Lollypop sticks/Sponges.
- ✓ Interesting objects or imagery you like.
- ✓ Natural objects sticks, shells, stones etc.
